## Dark Days by Lee Johnson—AmeriCorps Environmental Educator

On Monday, August 21st, 2017, some 12 million people across 14 states will briefly live in utter darkness during a time of day that is typically adorned with the sun's light. A total solar eclipse, where the moon's apparent diameter is larger than that of the sun's and blocks all direct sunlight, can be viewed for the first time since 1979 across the contiguous United States on that day. The rest of the United States and all of North America can expect to witness a partial eclipse, where the moon only blocks a fraction of direct sunlight. Our fascination with celestial occurrences of this nature is evident throughout recorded history, but we aren't the only ones who acknowledge them. Animals too have demonstrated changes in behavior during the duration of solar eclipses.

Often times the responses from animals to the arrival of darkness at an atypical point in the day will mirror how they would behave during the onset of twilight. In Zimbabwe during a 2001 total eclipse, many birds, save for owls and some other species, were witnessed flying in the direction of their nighttime roosts during an eclipse. Both impala and baboons were observed abandoning their foraging and the baboons began traveling – perhaps to their resting situates, though they ceased this behavior after the eclipse was over. Hippopotamuses began to enter the water as they characteristically would during nightfall. Reports of confusion among the hippos were reported as the eclipse concluded, their circadian rhythm apparently skewed. As an eclipse covered Guindy Forest in India in 1980, blackbuck, a species of antelope native to southern Asia, reduced their rates of grazing, walking, and standing and began to rest. Vertebrates aren't the only ones who possess an ostensible sensitivity to the effects of solar eclipses. Insects and spiders have been observed to alter their behavior due to abnormal times of darkness as well. During an eclipse in 1991, desert cicadas in Arizona were found to drastically reduce their calling during as darkness fell. This is thought to be the result of a drop in temperature, as the production of the cicada's song is an energy-intensive process, and it is believed to be impossible for the cicadas to produce their song if they aren't able to maintain a certain body temperature. Colonial orb-weaving spiders of Mexico were observed deconstructing their webs during a total solar eclipse in 1991 and reassembling them once the sunlight began to return. In this particular study, spiders that were being artificially illuminated did not disassemble their webs.

Possibly the most peculiar responses to a solar eclipse were those exhibited by a group of captive chimpanzees in 1984. As the initial dimming of light set in as the moon began to drape the sun, solitary female chimps and those with babies made their way to the top of a climbing structure. As the eclipse progressed, more chimps began to assemble on the climbing structure, positioning their bodies in the direction of the sun and moon, their faces pointed upwards. One juvenile stood upright and appeared to gesture towards the two celestial bodies. Once the moon had traveled beyond the sun's position, the chimps descended from the climbing structure. These behaviors were not observed before or after the duration of the eclipse.

Perhaps humans aren't the only species with a knack for inquisitiveness.

# **Scout Opportunities**



The ACORNS Outdoor Learning Center has had a growth spurt thanks to an army of volunteers and service groups!

Many groups of school students have used the OLC for their educational programs this spring. With the new improvements, we have been able to teach pre-k students about their senses in our Sensory Garden, and third graders about simple machines in several areas of the OLC!!

Thanks to George and several Girl Scout Troops working tirelessly, a multitude of saplings have been planted in the Forestry area. (When you visit look for the blue tubes).

Kathie Woika's Girl Scout troop helped weed all of the walkways, mulched areas, and weeded inside the tree enclosures. They also spread mulch throughout the entire OLC, and are growing plants for the OLC pollinator garden at home. Rainy weather didn't stop friends and fellow volunteers from honoring Dennis Wood - artist, professor, and long-time dedicated ACORNS Volunteer. Dennis was a very generous and good friend of the Genesee County Parks in many ways. He gave his time by participating in ACORNS meetings and field trips, and attending many educational programs. Dennis donated some of his own collections to the Interpretive Nature Center and funded the purchase of children's field binoculars for use during kid's programs at the park. Dennis was a very talented artist, and he provided beautiful note-cards for the ACORNS to sell as a fundraiser. The cards feature some of his landscapes and wildlife paintings, and are available for purchase at the Interpretive Center. Dennis loved to share the joys of art as a professor at GCC, and taught a beginner drawing class to the ACORNS as a volunteer training day. Dennis was a delightful person to be around and is remembered for his quiet way of making people smile and laugh.

Following a motion for funding by the ACORNS and a donation from Dennis' wife Jenny Wood, a fully functional artist's easel has been created as a memorial to Dennis. The memorial will be placed in the ACORNS Outdoor Learning Center at Genesee County Park & Forest. The memorial design was created by Paul Osborn, Parks Supervisor, and Kurt Schwab, Genesee County Highway Sign Maintenance Mechanic, which was then laser cut by Oxbo International. Genesee County Highway welder Rob Barone adapted the donated easel to install the newly created art platform, which was then painted by DJ Desjardins in the paint shop. A collaborative effort indeed!

The Rembas family made a generous donation to the park to honor their father, John, and their mother, Clara Rembas. John Rembas is remembered by his family for loving the Genesee County Park & Forest very much, thus where the family chose as a donation site in his memory. Discussions between the Rembas family and the ACORNS proceeded as planning for the ACORNS Outdoor Learning Center was underway.
